Women in Conflict 1325 Fellowship Programme

The Beyond Borders Women in Conflict 1325 Fellowship is a programme that aims to promote the principles enshrined in landmark UN Security Council Resolution 1325, which "affirms the importance of the participation of women and the inclusion of gender perspectives in peace negotiations, humanitarian planning, peacekeeping operations, and post-conflict peacebuilding and governance"

The Women in Conflict 1325 Fellowship programme aims to realise the principles of UNSCR1325 by:

- Gathering a diverse group of women activists from conflict-affected regions to be trained in practical skills relating to mediation, reconciliation, dialogue methodologies, and process design, with an emphasis on sustainable conflict resolution.
- Exploring methodologies for promoting the role of women in peace-building processes, and identifying entry points to those processes.
- Providing a safe space for women to connect, share stories, and take time for themselves away from their daily commitments.
- Creating a network of Fellows who can share resources, knowledge and collaborate across various regions and areas of work.

The History of the Fellowship: 2015

A partnership between Beyond Borders Scotland and the European Institute of Peace led to the establishment of a pilot 'Women in Conflict' programme, with the support of then-Executive Director of the EIP, Martin Griffiths.

2016-present

Tri-annual one week Fellowships in Edinburgh and the Scottish Borders offering workshops and training sessions on issues relating to the Women, Peace and Security agenda, the gender-conflet-climate nexus, and using the arts as a tool for peacebuilding are run.

2017

Multi-year funding for the Beyond Borders Women in Conflict 1325 Fellowship programme officially launched by then-First Minister of Scotland Nicola Sturgeon at UN Headquarters along with the Executive Director of UN Women, Phumzile Mlambo-Ngcuka, UN Assistant-Secretary General, Andrew Gilmour, and the Head of the UN DPPA's Policy and Mediation Division, Theresa Whitfield.

2018

Launch of the BBS Women in Conflict 1325 Alumnae Network and Community of Practice Programme.
